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WHY THE GAP PROGRAM IS NEEDED

Today's Reality:

The culture in America today is more anti-Christian than ever before. It's often called "post-Christian" America! The questions, criticisms and attacks are everywhere, especially in the 'social media', entertainment and news media, and throughout the internet. Our church leaders may get our kids' attention a couple of hours a week, but the culture gets them much of the remaining time, even for home schoolers and Christian academy students.

Alarming Trend:

Pastor John Mark has often quoted the alarming statistics of the high percentage of young Christians who abandon their faith after high school. Various surveys confirm that somewhere between 70% and 90% of 'Sunday school kids' walk away from their faith after high school. Some go all the way to atheism; some just become "nones", claiming "none" as their faith affiliation.

Unanswered Questions:

Perhaps more alarming, those who walk away will usually say, when asked, that they had questions and doubts as early as elementary school. Too often, they say their parents or church leaders were not able to answer the tough questions about God, the Bible, evolution, miracles and other topics. Knowing <u>what</u> we believe is often not enough in today's culture. We also need to know <u>why</u> it's true. (This is not a criticism of our children and youth programs. It's just that there is no substitute for the intentional involvement of parents in "inoculating" our kids against the attacks we know they will face.)

Parents Can Fight Back and Win:

Natasha Crain, a committed young Christian mom, started a blog several years ago, hoping to encourage and support other young moms as they struggle to raise committed, God-fearing young Christians. She was surprised when critics attacked her blog site. What's more, she found herself doubting some of her own beliefs because of the questions and criticisms that came pouring in. But rather than letting those questions gnaw away at her faith, she decided to find out if there are good answers to the criticisms. That led her on a journey that has become a nationwide ministry to help parents keep their kids on God's side.

We Are Commanded to Know Why We Are Christians:

Proverb 18:17 tells us that the case for the prosecution sounds very persuasive until we hear the case for the defense. Natasha's ministry provides the case for the defense of Christianity, in a down-to-earth practical way that we all can use to obey the command of 1 Peter 3:15-16. That command is to always be ready, with love and grace, to provide reasons and evidence for our faith, just as Paul and Peter and all the apostles did in the first century.

GAP Classes:

Based on her first book, "Keeping Your Kids On God's Side" (KYKOGS for short), churches all over North America are offering a series of classes designed to help parents have intentional discussions with their kids, discussions that **enable parents to bridge the gap** between what kids learn at church and what they see and hear in the culture. What could be more important than teaching our kids why Christianity is true as we prepare to launch them into today's anti-Christian world.


It's All About the Great Commission:

J Warner Wallace, our favorite cold case homicide detective, wrote this foreword for Natasha's book: (emphasis added)

"As a youth pastor, my first class of graduating seniors proved how difficult it can be to keep your kids on God's side. By the time they first returned from university (at Christmas break in their freshman year), most were no longer Christians. I couldn't believe it, and I felt like a terrible pastor. I had these students for their entire senior year of high school, yet nothing I taught them seemed to make an impact on the decisions they made in the first ten weeks at university. It was then that I realized the error of my inaugural year as a youth pastor. I had entertained them, helped them to form friendships in our youth group, and maybe even inspired them to be better human beings. But I hadn't given them sufficient reason to believe Christianity was true.

I quickly shifted gears. I was a part-time pastor and full-time homicide detective; my journey to faith was characterized by a careful examination of the evidence related to the existence of God and the reliability of the New Testament. Why hadn't I taken this approach with the students in my youth group? In many ways I simply got caught up in what has become the norm for many youth ministries. I wanted my group to grow, I wanted my students to like me, and I placed the bar very low in terms of what I required from them.

After that first year, I decided my students' future certainty was far more important than their present entertainment. That's why I love what Natasha Crain has done in her first book. As a parent, she gets it. Youth pastors simply can't do what each of us, as parents, must. The spiritual growth of our kids is our responsibility; we can't assign it to someone else. If you want to keep your kids in the truth, you're going to have to teach them why Christianity is true, and you're not going to be able to teach them unless you are willing to learn. Most of us, if pressed to defend what we believe as Christians, find ourselves woefully ill-equipped. [But] How are we ever going to prepare our kids if we aren't first prepared?

If you're a Christian parent but you haven't yet mastered the rich case for God's existence and the truth of the Christian worldview, this book is an excellent place to start. In fact, I consider Keeping Your Kids on God's Side to be an important, eye-opening "gateway" book. Natasha has done a wonderful job of quickly introducing the important issues and evidences from the perspective of a parent. She's engaging, thoughtful, and she knows how to throw the ball so you can catch it.

Ten Tips for Having Deeper Faith Conversations with Your Kids

About the Class Leaders

Ron and Diane Woodruff are parents of two grown daughters. They have lived and worked in numerous locations throughout the U.S. and the world. Ron studied business and chemistry in his undergrad work and then earned an MBA with a focus on information science. He has spent most of his career working in various management positions with Beckman Coulter, Inc., a major medical device company.

Ron has been leading various Bible classes and study groups for the past 20 years. He has a special passion for building more confident disciples by equipping others to become more effective ambassadors* for Christ. To that end, he has been certified as the director of the Collin County Reasonable Faith chapter*, an active group with regular meetings. He is also a graduate of Cottonwood Creek's 'Ministry Academy' and the 'Parent Ambassador' for Natasha Crain's GAP campaign.

Ron's belief is that only God can save and that our efforts to build more confident disciples must always be both subordinate to and aligned with the work of the Holy Spirit. At the same time, we are commanded to always be ready to defend our faith when questioned and even when criticized. In other words, God is in charge and will always do His part, but He has given us the responsibility to do our part as well. This reminds us of the Christian who leaned on his shovel and prayed for a hole in the ground. Our responsibility to do our part, to have a ready defense, is not only a Biblical command, it is also repeatedly modeled for us by the apostles, the early church fathers and even by Jesus. The bottom line: Evidence matters and evidence defeats doubt.

While the evidence and answers are important, it's even more important that we learn the skills of an ambassador, including tact, grace and 'conversation management'. In other words, how we respond is much more important than how much we know. Ron believes and teaches that the worst way to respond to questions and criticisms is to reactively argue for our position. Being right is seldom enough, by itself, in our desire to persuade others. Instead, asking non-threatening questions is almost always the best way to respond. After gathering a deeper understanding of the reasons for a question or criticism, the next best step is usually a short but personal story. These are vitally important skills that we will learn together in the GAP series.

Several other parents have offered to help lead the class but we won't share that information until their commitment is fully confirmed. Meanwhile, feel free to reach out to Ron.
